KATERI CALLAHAN, *President, Alliance to Save Energy*

Kateri Callahan, president of the Alliance to Save Energy since 2004, has more than 20 years of experience in policy advocacy, fundraising, coalition building and organizational management. The Alliance conducts policy, communications, research, education and market transformation initiatives in the U.S. and more than a dozen other countries. Its Associates Program includes nearly 200 international businesses, associations and interest groups.

Callahan serves as the Alliance's principal spokesperson, appearing regularly before Congress and the media and addressing conferences and gatherings around the world on energy efficiency and its role in addressing environmental, economic and national security issues.

Callahan serves on the Keystone Center Energy Board and the Business Council for Sustainable Energy and on advisory councils to Better Homes and Gardens and the U.S. Chamber of Commerce 21st Century Energy Institute. In June 2009, Callahan was among the 23 inaugural inductees to the Energy Efficiency Hall of Fame established by Johnson Controls Inc. and the United States Energy Association.

In addition to working with homeowners, Rose DiNapoli Interiors & Decorative Arts works with architects and builders to develop color palettes, lighting plans and other finish selections to ensure that homes relate to their historical context but remain connected to the present.

KATHLEEN HOGAN, Deputy Assistant Secretary for Energy Efficiency,
U.S. Department of Energy (DOE)

Dr. Kathleen Hogan is Deputy Assistant Secretary for Energy Efficiency in the Office of Energy Efficiency and Renewable Energy (EERE) at the DOE, where she oversees a more than \$900 million annual energy efficiency policy, program and research portfolio.

Prior to this position, Dr. Hogan served for more than 10 years as the Division Director at the U.S. Environmental Protection Agency responsible for the development and operation of clean energy programs, including ENERGY STAR, programs for combined heat and power and renewable energy, corporate leadership and efforts focused on state clean energy policies. She was also a key convener of the National Action Plan for Energy Efficiency and has served as a technical advisor on the boards of national and regional energy efficiency organizations.

Dr. Hogan has been recognized with a Presidential Rank Award, induction into the Energy Efficiency Hall of Fame of the U.S. Energy Association and as a contributor to the Nobel Peace Prize awarded to the Intergovernmental Panel on Climate Change.

Dr. Hogan has a Ph.D. from the Department of Geography and Environmental Engineering at Johns Hopkins University and a Bachelor of Science in Chemistry from Bucknell University.



PEKKA HAKKARAINEN, Vice President, Lutron Electronics; Chair, Lighting
Systems Division of the National Electrical Manufacturers Association

Dr. Pekka Hakkarainen is Vice President at Lutron Electronics and is currently assigned to work in Government and Industry Relations, including Standards activities. He has held several other- mostly technical- positions in his 20+ years at Lutron and holds seven patents.

Hakkarainen is currently serving as Chair of the Lighting Systems Division of the National Electrical Manufacturers Association (NEMA) and is a voting member of the ASHRAE 90.1 Committee and a member of the Illuminating Engineering Society of North America (IESNA). He has previously chaired several NEMA and IESNA committees and has served on numerous other industry committees and advisory groups.

Dr. Hakkarainen received a BA/MA degree in Mathematics from Cambridge University, England, and a PhD in Plasma Physics from MIT.
